15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Multidisciplinary/ interdisciplinary:

- The term `quality education' from the vision of our college in par with NEP is aligned towards a high quality teaching, research and community engagement since its inception.
- 2. Being an Arts and Science college, Sri Sarada College for Women (Autonomous), Salem caters to science, technology and mathematics in STEM by providing an opportunity to students majoring in arts to study science through several courses. However, few are mentioned below: (i) Non-Major Electives (NME) for undergraduate students offered namely communicable disease and management and life span nutrition from department of zoology and home science respectively; industrial chemistry and diary chemistry from department of chemistry; and basic mathematics and business statistics from department of mathematics and statistics, respectively; Non-Major Skill Based (NMSB) for undergraduate students such as industrial mathematics and mathematical modelling from department of mathematics, Extra Disciplinary Courses (EDC) for post graduate students namely medical physics and therapeutical chemistry from department of physics and chemistry respectively, provides knowledge about scientific and mathematical understanding to solve problems in everyday living. (ii) Non-Major Skill Based for undergraduate students such as food chemistry from department of chemistry, mushroom cultivation from department of botany; Advanced Diploma Course (ADC) on Gardening and Landscaping and sericulture from department of botany and zoology respectively offers an opportunity for bio entrepreneurship among students irrespective of their discipline. (iii) ADC on Computer Programming, NME on photoediting and Animation, and NMSB on Web designing and Desktop publishing from the department of computer science and a core paper on Tamizhum Kanninium from the department of Tamil to post graduate tamil students provides an enhanced learning on technology to sustain working with real world applications and scenarios.
- 3. The institution offers flexible curricular in terms of credit based elective courses in all disciplines, UG group projects in the fourth semester and environmental projects in the

second semester which pertain to seek a sustainable outcome in the society through engaging with community, and value based education via several core and elective courses in all disciplines and articulation and idea fixation classes such as Ramayana, Mahabharatha and Indian National Education, life skill courses (Jeevan Kaushal) offered in the college collectively contributes towards a holistic and multidisciplinary education. In addition, the financial support received through DBT STAR College Scheme allows students from the participating departments to receive hands on training on several experiments and skills across majors and submission of interdisciplinary group projects which also accounts towards multidisciplinary education.

- 4. The institution offers Environmental study projects in the second semester and Society Connect Projects in each semester to all the undergraduates on the topics namely awareness on COVID measures, deforestation; measures towards sustainable use of water and electricity, etc in par with current issues and challenges.
- 5. The institution promotes multidisciplinary/ interdisciplinary education through ADC and EDC courses, and various association, cell and club activities in terms of student participation in competitions and exhibitions across all disciplines.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic bank of credits (ABC):

- 1. The institution is yet to implement the Academic bank of credits as proposed in NEP 2020.
- 2. The institution is yet to register under ABC.
- 3. Efforts are taken by the institution to implement seamless collaboration and credit transfer in the near future.
- 4. Faculty with sufficient expertise in emerging areas of respective subjects are identified and encouraged to frame a curriculum partly or majoring a wholesome core/ elective courses and the content are perused and passed in the Board of Studies (BoS) and approved by Academic Council and implemented. Subsequently, emphasis and encouragement is laid on the preparation of preliminary handouts followed by study materials for the welfare of students which indeed undergoes the perusal of subject experts during BoS and shared with the students. Faculty members are given freedom to choose the

various pedagogical tools such as e-content, game based teaching, usage of online platforms, etc to create an interesting environment during the teaching-learning process of the curriculum. Further, several reference material, assignments, and other relevant materials for the students are also shared via the Microsoft Teams. In addition, assignments and several other components are submitted by the students and assessed by the faculty on the same. The Video Recording Centre with its state of art setup in our institution benefits our faculty members to record their contents and shared with the students provide flexibility to understand material at their own pace. Several rubrics on the assessments of the components are developed by the faculty members and implemented.

5. The institution is at the stage of providing orientation regarding ABC and is at the infancy of its adoption.

17.Skill development:

Skill development:

- 1. The college is running several training programmes to strengthen the soft skill of the students.
- 2. The details of the programme which are moderately aligned with NSQF providing a strong framework to strengthen the level of knowledge, skills and aptitude of the students are as follows: (i) A short term entrepreneurial skill development programme on 'Home - made chocolate making' was conducted in association with Khadi & Village Industries Commission, Ministry of MSME, Government of India for the welfare of our students. Subsequently, the students from Institution's Innovation Council participated in the 'Demo Day', an exhibition cum sale on the same depicting an entrepreneurial avenue. (ii) Several training programme on soft skills, interview and employability skills were given to all the third year undergraduate and II Year PG students for an effective productivity during their employment. (iii) Advanced diploma courses offered by the institution on tourism management, vedic mathematics, renewable energy management and audit, food service management etc., offers an opportunity to students to learn the skills of their choice. (iv) Several Skill based courses as theory and practical for eg., Entrepreneurial Development, Human Resource Development, Data analysis using excel, SPSS and R, Electrical circuit and network skills, etc., are initiated across all departments of the college in their respective majors to culminate diverse skills and talents. (v) Various clubs,

association and cell programmes for instance, social media marketing - opportunities and challenges, noteworthy skills to serve in banking sector, consumer adoption and use of epayments, etc., are being conducted to upgrade the knowledge and skills to compete with the transition to job market. (v) Internship and inplant trainings are allowed for the second year undergraduates to receive practical skills and understand how their respective discipline industry works.

- 3. The following are in practice by the institution in providing value-based education to the students: (i) In order to stick to the righteousness in this complex and constantly evolving world, articulation and idea fixation classes on Ramayana, Mahabharatha and Indian National Education are offered to all the students of our college throughout their period of study. In addition, counselling classes on various topics, Morning Prayer with meditation and Thought for the day also orient the students to perceive a fulfilling life. (ii) The institution also integrates several core and elective courses on the following aspects:
- Environment and sustainability Environmental studies, Plant Ecology, Green and Water chemistry, etc
- Gender gender studies, women studies, etc
- Human values Life Skills
- Professional ethics Approaches to English Language Teaching

in the curriculum. (iii) The nation's important days such as Republic Day, Martyrs' Day and Independence day are fully observed with a variety of events planned as an attempt of maintaining the viable patriotism among the students. (iv) The NSS, YRC and RRC units of the institution carry out several programmes and campaigns on cleanliness, freedom India tree plantation, blood donation camps, dengue awareness, crime against women and children, free dental camp, and orientation programme for school students, etc to equip the students with the sensitivity and responsibility to identify and solve the issues and challenges in society. (v) Activities from Institutions' Innovation Council and the DBT STAR funded programmes such as Approach to Scientific Research, Roads that took me to innovation, Idea Hackathon, Preliminary competitions for National Innovation Contest, etc kindled the virtues of logical reasoning, scientific method of approach to problem solving among the students.

4. The institution subsequently aligned with NSQF in view of NEP2020 will be attempted.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Indian Knowledge System:

- 1. In line with the vision of our college 'To empower women through quality education based on the ideals of our national heritage and culture', the curriculum of the institution includes a number of courses and topics which integrate Indian Knowledge System in it. For instance, core courses such as (i) History of Economic Thoughts especially on Chanakya's and Thiruvalluvar's by department of Economics, (ii) Tholkappiyam, a comprehensive text on ancient extant tamil scripture by department of Tamil, (iii) Archaeology, Social and Cultural History of Tamil Nadu by department of History, (iv) Advanced Diploma Course on Vedic Mathematics and Bhagavad Gita from department of Mathematics and Sanskrit respectively, (v) Non Major Skill Based on Herbal Therapy including Ayurveda, Naturopathy and Siddha medicine from department of Botany (vi) Part I Sanskrit on scientific literature (Ancient Indian Knowledge System), ethics, morals and human values to the first and second year undergraduates and (vii) Extra Disciplinary Course on Therapeutical Chemistry including Indian Healing System of Ayurveda and Siddha medicine are taught to the students as a part of exposure to the traditional knowledge of India's rich heritage. Students imbibe the knowledge and hence, pave way to accelerate their self-learning and life-long learning process. Further, the articulation and idea fixation classes on Ramayana and Mahabharatha to the first and second year undergraduates, Value Education classes on Indian National Education by Srimath Swami Chidbhavananda throwing light on Indian civilization and education are offered for all the third year undergraduates. Similarly, classes on Man making message of Swami Vivekananda which could inculcate harmonious development of body, mind and soul are offered to the post graduate students of all disciplines.
- 2. Even though, our medium of instruction is English, empathizing the rural background of the students, the faculty deliver the classes bilingually giving more importance to the vernacular language (i.e) Tamil followed by English to familiarize the concepts in both the languages. In addition, the Bridge Course to the first and second year undergraduates favours the above mentioned students to facilitate and acquaint the

respective programme and courses.

- 3. M.A. Tamil degree course is taught in the Indian language, Tamil. In addition, Part I - Tamil, Hindi, and Sanskrit are also offered for first and second year undergraduates. Other programmes except English stream are delivered bilingually.
- 4. (i) Besides being taught as Part I-Sanskrit, recitation of Gayathri mantra, and Namavazhi is practiced during prayer everyday. Vedha chanting signifying the relation between Guru and Shishya are done by the students during Lighting ceremony. Bhagavad Gita, apart from being taught as ADC, the regular chanting is being encouraged by conducting competition and during Martyrs' day. (ii) NSS of the institution has taught Yoga and Surya Namaskars to the student volunteers and rural public. Further, they have taken the online and offline Surya Namaskar challenge along with 75 crore Indians. Heritage Club and the allied association of the institution has organised various programmes viz, webinar on Gandhian thoughts, History and culture of Tamil people known in the Archaeology Research, Arts & Architecture of Pandyas, Gazhals in Neo-Sanskrit literature, Reviving Heritage Rice: A boon to Health, Role of epigraphy in the History of Tamil Nadu, Padaipuppukkalai Uruvakkam, Illakiyathil Penpar Pulavargal, Amazing secrets behind Temple Architecture, etc. inorder to promote and preserve Indian culture, tradition and arts.
- 5. The core value of the institution aligns with the IKS in view of NEP 2020.

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

The Institution is extending its yeoman service to the developmental needs of women in Salem district for the past 60 years with 12 UG, 9 PG, 9 M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes in disciplines including Arts and Science stream. The curricula developed for all programmes are career oriented and focusses on vision and mission of the institution. The POs and COs of each programmes are designed in a systematic manner such that the curriculum ponders over the global and local needs to empower the students in all dimensions.The mechanism used for upgradation of curriculum is facilitated by Curriculum Development Cell of the institution. Feedback mechanism paves way for envisaging and revision of need based syllabi, followed by faculty meetings, Board of Studies meetings and Academic Council's suggestions and approval. There are 75 spacious classrooms, the size ranging from 400 sq. ft. to 1200 sq. ft. 24 classrooms/ halls are harnessed with ICT facilities out of which 16 are smart classrooms. There are 24 laboratories with advanced equipment and modern facilities. The institution provides software like Argus lab, Gaussian, AIMAL and ChemDraw. Gaussian, Origin, GSAS, WinXMorph and ImageJ, R Programming, TORA, MIKTEX, GeoGebra and MATLAB, Python and PHP, SPSS and Face2Face.The Central Instrumentation Centre is equipped with the state of the art instruments obtained through DST-FIST assistance. English, Tamil Lanugage Labs are endowed with 33 and 8 computers and one Laptop respectively. A video recording room with all necessary gadgets is available.

The departments are equipped with a total of 386 computers. Swayam Learning, INFLIBNET and 12 broadband connectivity with 8mbps and LAN facilities are available. The Examination Office is automated to carry out the examination related activities like publishing the results and the issuance of certificates on time. 1. Thrift society offering loan facility: The campus' cooperative thrift society offers plans for quick financial support for both teaching professionals and non-teaching staff in times of need and urgency

2. Annual health camps are held in the institution and are organised by NSS and RRC. During these camps, teaching and nonteaching staff members receive complete health examinations, appropriate medicine, counselling, and guidance.

3. Covid-19 immunisation drive: The university made it a top priority to schedule vaccination drives well in advance to immunise the employees, both teaching and non-teaching.

4. The institution offers free, secure parking for two-wheelers.

5. Workshops for non-teaching employees and faculty development programmes for teaching personnel were organised.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Internal stock audits of the College's various units are performed by an inventory auditing (stock verification) team appointed by the principal. The teams conduct inter-departmental checks to physically examine the equipment system, and other resources such as department library books, as well as inspect documents kept by them. The auditors of the apex cooperative body audit the finances of the college's Staff co-operative thrift and credit association. The grants received for projects are carefully audited, and utilisation certificates, along with the audited statement of finances, are provided to the funding agencies. The institution's accounts are audited annually by a recognised entity with Statutory Auditors (N.Ramanujam & co., Karur) appointed by Sri Sarada College Educational Trust. The Statutory Auditors audit the college's financial and statutory compliance aspects and report their findings to management. If any disparity is discovered, the authority raises a complaint, which is then reported to management and corrected as soon as possible. Government auditing is performed on a regular basis by the following government departments.

Case study-1

Despite its shortcomings, the institution has done a fantastic job using digital tools to inform and guide the students as the postaccreditation quality initiative strategy. This paradigm shift has created a safe learning environment and facilitated expansion both horizontally and vertically outside of the realm of academia. It facilitatedtheresource persons to providelectures from their locations. Internal components, quizzes, alumni gatherings, and other health awareness lectures were also delivered via webinar by all the departments in an effort to break down social taboos among students. The technology requirement in education will be satisfied by refreezing this technological connection.

Case study-II

Women Community Connect Centre (WCCC) extended its service to the tribal community this year to give a holistic learning that encourages students to think critically, to express themselves clearly and to discover meaning and purpose in life. Organized three days outreach programme for the Pattipadi ,Velur Tribal community in Yercaud from 24.02.22 - 26.02.22. A total of 48 tribal community people benefitted from the camp. For the first time the WCCC ventured this outreach activity in a tribal area in which the students understood the unique life style of the tribal community.

6.5.2 - The institution reviews its teaching-learning process, structures and methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through its IQAC as per norms

IQAC takes measures to review and improve the teaching-learning process through well-structured academic audits, with an aim to gain checks and balances for ensuring academic standards. Under academic audit, each department conducts inter-departmental audit on course files and submits the compliance report to IQAC. The components of the course files such as course content, entry behaviour test, work plan and modes of continuous assessments were audited. The Departments adopted various continuous assessment modes which include essay writing, presentations, seminars, working models and open book exams.

As assessment is a continuous process and periodic activity, the institution's IQAC periodically assesses the teaching and learning process each year to gauge its success and identify areas for improvement. This triangulation of student feedback from many educational viewpoints increased the evaluation's trustworthiness. The institution uses learning outcome-based education as a studentcentric learning approach to evaluate students' progress based on a pre-set set of outcomes that graduates are expected to attend during their course to maximise their potential in accordance with their particular programmes. IQAC identifies the lacunae in the teaching-learning process and based on the requirement, drafts an agenda of the annual plan at the beginning of the academic year.

A health care centre functions to attend to the emergency needs. The campus includes two common rooms for the staff and students. It includes a safe and spacious hostel. The college has introduced courses related to women empowerment. It offers certificate courses, tailoring course and organises Expos. Once in a month counseling classes are conducted to identify and rectify the personal and academic issues of all the students. Students are also given counseling by the clinical psychologists. The students follow a unique dress code, either half saree or saree. Dropouts

due to marriage are allowed to redo their courses. When the students go for field trips, internships and industrial visits, the teachers accompany them.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

Waste management activities are required to manage solid, liquid, e-wastes etc., from its origin to final disposition.

Solid Waste Management

The solid wastes generated in campus are disposed off in a systematic way. Dustbins are placed everywhere to collect the wastes. The biodegradable waste and litters are sent to the yard for humification process and it is taken care by the Department of Botany. The produced humus is mixed with kitchen wastes of the hostel, and vermicomposted in campus. It is monitored by Department of Zoology.Non-biodegradable wastes are disposed with the help of Salem Corporation.

Liquid Waste Management

Liquid waste in campus is disposed in a systematic way through proper drainage system.

E-Waste Management

The students and teachers are sensitized about the effects of ewastes. E-source reduction is achieved through minor repairs of devices. The e-wastes are classified and set apart in a separate room

Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management

Fume hood and exhaust fans are used in laboratories to minimize the exposure to hazardous chemical substances. Chemical wastes are reduced by adopting semi-micro/micro-techniques and experiments involving carcinogenic solvent are replaced with computational modeling. The PG projects are undertaken giving due emphasis to more green and society oriented.
