15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary	
<p>The term 'quality education' from the vision of our college in par with NEP is aligned towards a high quality teaching, research and community engagement since its inception. Being an Arts and Science college, Sri Sarada College for Women (Autonomous), Salem caters to science, technology and mathematics in STEM by providing an opportunity to students majoring in arts to study science through several courses. However, few are mentioned below: (i) Non-Major Electives (NME) for undergraduate students offered namely Biocomposting for Entrepreneurship and Indian Health Science from department of Zoology and Home Science respectively; Food Chemistry and Diary Chemistry from department of Chemistry; and Mathematics for Competitive Examination and Quantitative Aptitude for Competitive Examination and Basics of Statistics from department of mathematics and statistics, respectively; Non-Major Skill Based (NMSB) for undergraduate students such as Industrial Mathematics with R Programming and Mathematical Modelling with R Programming from department of mathematics provides knowledge about scientific and mathematical understanding to solve problems in everyday living. Extra Disciplinary Courses (EDC) for post graduate students namely Sewage and Waste water Treatment and Reuse and Therapeutical Chemistry from department of physics and chemistry respectively provides to handle the environmental and health issues. (ii) Non-Major Skill Based for undergraduate students such as Home Chemistry from department of chemistry, Mushroom Cultivation from department of botany; Advanced Diploma Course (ADC) on Gardening and Landscaping and Sericulture from department of botany and zoology</p>	

respectively offers an opportunity for bio entrepreneurship among students irrespective of their discipline. (iii) ADC on Computer Programming, NME on Office Automation and NMSB on Data Analytics and Visualization from the department of computer science provides an enhanced learning on technology to sustain working with real world applications and scenarios. The institution offers flexible curriculum in terms of credit based elective courses in all disciplines, UG group projects in the fourth and Sixth semesters which pertain to seek a sustainable outcome in the society through engaging with community, and value based education via several core and elective courses in all disciplines and articulation and idea fixation classes such as Ramayana, Mahabharatha and Indian National Education, life skill courses (Jeevan Kaushal) offered in the college collectively contributes towards a holistic and multidisciplinary education. In addition, equipments procured through the financial support received through DBT STAR College Scheme allows students from the participating departments to receive hands on training on several experiments and skills across majors. The institution offers Society Connect Projects in each semester to all the undergraduates and postgraduates on the topics relating to Azad Ka Amrit Mahotsav and Women Entrepreneurial Development programmes in the adopted villages. The institution promotes multidisciplinary/ interdisciplinary education through ADC and EDC courses, and various association, cell and club activities in terms of student participation in competitions and exhibitions across all disciplines.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The institution is yet to implement the Academic bank of credits as proposed in NEP 2020. The institution is yet to register under ABC. Efforts are taken by the institution to implement seamless collaboration and credit transfer in the near future. Faculty with sufficient expertise in emerging areas of respective subjects are identified and encouraged to frame a curriculum partly or majoring a wholesome core/ elective courses and the content are perused and passed in the Board of Studies (BoS) and approved by Academic Council and implemented. Subsequently, emphasis and encouragement is laid on the preparation of preliminary handouts followed by study materials for the welfare of students which indeed undergoes the perusal of subject experts during BoS and shared with the students. Faculty members are given freedom to choose the various pedagogical tools such as e-content, game based teaching, usage of online platforms, etc to create an interesting environment during the teaching-learning process of the curriculum. Further, several reference material, assignments, and other relevant materials for

the students are also shared via the Microsoft Teams. In addition, assignments and several other components are submitted by the students and assessed by the faculty on the same. The Video Recording Centre with its state of art setup in our institution benefits our faculty members to record their contents and shared with the students provide flexibility to understand material at their own pace. Several rubrics on the assessments of the components are developed by the faculty members and implemented. The institution is at the stage of providing orientation regarding ABC and is at the infancy of its adoption.

17.Skill development:

a. The college is running several training programmes to strengthen the soft skill of the students, however not on the ten level scale as proposed by National Skills Qualification Framework. b. The details of the programme which are moderately aligned with NSQF providing a strong framework to strengthen the level of knowledge, skills and aptitude of the students are as follows: (i) A short term entrepreneurial skill development programme on 'Aari & Embroidery work Training programme' was conducted in association with Khadi & Village Industries Commission, Ministry of MSME, Government of India for the welfare of our students. Subsequently, the students from Institution's Innovation Council participated in the 'Demo Day', an exhibition on the same depicting an entrepreneurial avenue. (ii) Several training programmes on soft skills, interview and employability skills were given to all the third year undergraduate and II Year PG students for an effective productivity during their employment. (iii) Advanced diploma courses offered by the institution on tourism management, vedic mathematics, renewable energy management and audit, food service management etc., offers an opportunity to students to learn the skills of their choice. (iv) Several Skill based courses as theory and practical for eg., Problem Solving Tecqniques, Cyber Security, Clinical Biochemistry, Bakery, Nursery and Landscaping etc., are initiated across all departments of the college in their respective majors to culminate diverse skills and talents. (v) Various clubs, association and cell programmes for instance, social media marketing - opportunities and challenges, noteworthy skills to serve in banking sector, consumer adoption and use of e-payments, etc., are being conducted to upgrade the knowledge and skills to compete with the transition to job market. (v) Internship and inplant trainings are allowed for the second year undergraduates to receive practical skills and understand how their respective discipline industry works. c. The following are in practice by the institution in providing value-based education to the students: (i) In order to stick to the

righteousness in this complex and constantly evolving world, articulation and idea fixation classes on Ramayana, Mahabharatha and Indian National Education are offered to all the students of our college throughout their period of study. In addition, counselling classes on various topics, Morning Prayer with meditation and Thought for the day also orient the students to perceive a fulfilling life. (ii) The institution also integrates several core and elective courses on the following aspects: Environment and sustainability - Environmental studies, Plant Ecology, Green and Water chemistry, etc Gender - gender studies, women studies, etc Human values - Life Skills Professional ethics - Approaches to English Language Teaching in the curriculum. (iii) The nation's important days such as Republic Day, Martyrs' Day and Independence day are fully observed with a variety of events planned as an attempt of maintaining the viable patriotism among the students. (iv) The NSS, YRC and RRC units of the institution carry out several programmes and campaigns on Swachhta Pakhwada, Youth Welfare, Health Care, Environmental Awareness, Women's Safety freedom etc., to equip the students with the sensitivity and responsibility to identify and solve the issues and challenges in society. (v) Activities from Institutions' Innovation Council that took me to innovation, Idea Hackathon, Preliminary competitions for National Innovation Contest, etc., kindled the virtues of logical reasoning, scientific method of approach to problem solving among the students. d & e) The institution subsequently aligned with NSQF in view of NEP2020 will be attempted.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

a. In line with the vision of our college 'To empower women through quality education based on the ideals of our national heritage and culture', the curriculum of the institution includes a number of courses and topics which integrate Indian Knowledge System in it. For instance, courses such as (i) Tholkappiyam, a comprehensive text on ancient extant tamil scripture by department of Tamil, (ii) Archaeology, Social and Cultural History of Tamil Nadu by department of History, (iii) Advanced Diploma Course on Vedic Mathematics and Bhagavad Gita from department of Mathematics and Sanskrit respectively, (iv) Non Major Skill Based on Herbal Therapy including Ayurveda, Naturopathy and Siddha medicine from department of Botany (v) Part I Sanskrit on scientific literature (Ancient Indian Knowledge System), ethics, morals and human values to the first and second year undergraduates and (vi) Extra Disciplinary Course on Therapeutical Chemistry including Indian Healing System of Ayurveda and Siddha medicine are taught to the students as a part of exposure

to the traditional knowledge of India's rich heritage. Students imbibe the knowledge and hence, pave way to accelerate their self-learning and life-long learning process. Further, the articulation and idea fixation classes on Ramayana and Mahabharatha to the first and second year undergraduates, Value Education classes on Indian National Education by Srimath Swami Chidbhavananda throwing light on Indian civilization and education are offered for all the third year undergraduates. Similarly, classes on Man making message of Swami Vivekananda which could inculcate harmonious development of body, mind and soul are offered to the post graduate students of all disciplines. b. Even though, our medium of instruction is English, empathizing the rural background of the students, the faculty deliver the classes bilingually giving more importance to the vernacular language (i.e) Tamil followed by English to familiarize the concepts in both the languages. In addition, the Bridge Course to the first and second year undergraduates favours the above mentioned students to facilitate and acquaint the respective programme and courses. c. M.A. Tamil degree course is taught in the Indian language, Tamil. In addition, Part I - Tamil, Hindi, and Sanskrit are also offered for first and second year undergraduates. Other programmes except English stream are delivered bilingually. d. (i) Besides being taught as Part I-Sanskrit, recitation of Gayathri mantra, and Namavazhi is practiced during prayer everyday. Vedha chanting signifying the relation between Guru and Shishya are done by the students during Lighting ceremony. Bhagavad Gita, apart from being taught as ADC, the regular chanting is being encouraged by conducting competition and during Martyrs' day. (ii) NSS of the institution has celebrated the International Yoga Day by taking pledge by the student volunteers and rural public. Heritage Club and the allied association of the institution has organised various programmes viz, Webinar/ Special lecture on, The Aesthetics of Literature, Tholliyalum Kal Ezhuththum, Salem Historical Moments, Tamil verse Writing Competition etc. inorder to promote and preserve Indian culture, tradition and arts. e. The core value of the institution aligns with the IKS in view of NEP 2020.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The institution's curriculum is in line with outcome based education including specific course outcome mapped across programme outcome. Further, the automated question bank comprising of questions of all orders serves the purpose of assessing the learning outcomes. Quality enhancement of teachers through Orientation course, Refresher course and Faculty Development Programmes are encouraged among the faculty to update themselves. Further, the students are exposed to student centric learning through field visits, industrial

visits, exhibitions, seminars, webinars, society connect activities, group projects, lab training, workshops, internships/inplant training, projects based learning for solving problems and peer-learning. Concept Mapping is introduced as one of the mandatory Continuous Assessment components.

20.Distance education/online education:

With the adoption of OBE and technological intervention, the blended learning has become a normal routine rather than an extravagance. Faculty are encouraged to create their e-contents periodically using the infrastructure available at the video recording centre available at the institution. With the MS-Teams platform the institution conducts virtual lectures, workshops by various resource persons and submission and assessment of various component, sharing of reference materials enable the blended-learning. Students are also encouraged towards flipped classrooms and Post graduates have seminar as one of their internal components in the curriculum for which they use the intervention of smart boards.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

There are 75 generously sized classrooms, ranging from 400 sq. ft. to 1200 sq. ft., with 24 classrooms or halls equipped with ICT facilities, including 16 smart classrooms. Additionally, the institution boasts 24 modern laboratories furnished with advanced equipment and software tools like Argus lab, Gaussian, AIMAL, and ChemDraw, among others. The Central Instrumentation Centre is outfitted with cutting-edge instruments procured through DST-FIST assistance. Furthermore, the English and Tamil Language Labs are equipped with 33 and 8 computers, respectively, along with a designated video recording room featuring essential gadgets. The departments collectively possess a total of 370 computers, and the institution offers Swayam Learning, INFLIBNET, 16 broadband connectivity channels with maximum of 150mbps, and LAN facilities. Moreover, the Examination Office is automated to efficiently handle examination-related tasks such as result publication and certificate issuance. Lastly, the Central Library boasts an impressive collection, housing 81341 books, 65 Print Journals, and 339 CDs/DVDs.

Sister Nivedita auditorium is a versatile venue known for hosting a diverse array of events, accommodating nearly 3000 students at a time. The auditorium is equipped with excellent audio and acoustics, facilitating various activities such as daily morning prayers, audio-visual presentations during Seminars, Workshops, Conferences, Symposia, Meetings, Functions, Celebrations, Film projections, Ph.D. viva-voce, and Yoga sessions. Additionally, the basement area beneath the auditorium serves as a space for drama, dance, and music rehearsals.

The 'Sri Sarada Kalai Arangam,' situated in the quadrangle, hosts special programs during Independence Day and Republic Day celebrations. The institution boasts a proud history of excelling in sports and games, with students actively participating in competitions at the National, State, university, and District levels since 1965. The college provides extensive infrastructure for both indoor and outdoor games. Indoor facilities include Chess, Carrom, and Table Tennis, while the outdoor sports court accommodates games such as Basketball, Kabaddi, Hockey, Tennis, Ball Badminton, and Handball. Furthermore, the college features a 200-meter track, Long Jump pit, High Jump pit, and a dedicated Gymnasium room for practicing Aerobics and training exercises.

With a student-computer ratio of 7:1, the college ensures ample access to computing resources. The computing infrastructure is supported by 4 servers, catering to a range of software needs. The college utilizes proprietary software like Microsoft Campus licenses, Mat Lab, AIM PAC, NBO, Gaussian 09W, SPSS, and Turbomole, while also embracing open-source software such as Argus lab, R programming, Tora, Mictex, Geogebra, among others.

Comprehensive computing and internet facilities are readily available to both faculty and students across the campus. The institution generously provides access to desktop systems and laptops, enabling their utilization for academic projects, practical sessions, and learning endeavors. To enhance the learning process, faculty members employ innovative teaching methods, including group assignments and interactive PowerPoint presentations, fostering collaborative knowledge exploration among students. Incorporating visual aids and software-based learning further enriches the learning experience, making it more engaging and comprehensive for the students.

Additionally, the college utilizes software for streamlining admission processes and examination management. The library operations are fully automated using an Integrated Library Management system (ILMS), ensuring efficient management of library resources.

Under the direction of the administration, the auditorium, departments, seminar halls, and classrooms are kept clean. The Spic and Span club ensures on-campus cleaning. To maintain a clean atmosphere, surveillance cameras are used to keep a careful watch on campus maintenance. The library frequently updates its contents and carefully cares for its collection of books and journals. An e-gate register and Lips I Net software are used to expedite visitor access. Visitors must enter their barcoded ID number both while entering and leaving. Additionally, the library has twenty computers that are mostly used by researchers and research staff, giving them access to journals, magazines, and INFLIBNET. Regular monitoring ensures that the computer labs and center are operating at maximum efficiency. The Sports ground is well-maintained, providing players with equipped kits. Separate organized parking facilities for both faculty members and students are available. Adequate drinking water facilities, facilitated by water purifiers, are available throughout the campus. 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The principal appoints an inventory auditing (stock verification) team to conduct internal stock audits of the College's various units. In order to physically inspect the equipment system, department library books, and documents that they maintain, the teams perform interdepartmental checks. The college's Staff co-operative thrift and credit association's finances are examined by the auditors of the highest cooperative body. Grants for projects are thoroughly audited, and the funding agencies receive utilization certificates and the audited statement of finances. Every year, the Sri Sarada College Educational Trust appoints Statutory Auditors (N. Ramanujam & Co., Karur) to audit the institution's financial statements. The college's finances and statutory compliance are examined by the Statutory Auditors, who then report their findings to management. When a discrepancy is found, the authority files a complaint, which is subsequently brought to management's attention and promptly fixed. Regular government audits are conducted by the following government agencies.

In order to establish checks and balances for maintaining academic standards, IQAC conducts well-structured academic audits to evaluate and enhance the teaching-learning process. Every department performs an interdepartmental audit on course files as part of academic audit, and at the end of the year, it submits the compliance report to IQAC. The course files, work plan, entry behavior test, course content, and methods of ongoing evaluation are all audited. The departments implemented a number of continuous assessment methods, such as open-book exams, working models, seminars, presentations, and essay writing. The corresponding department heads signed the compliance reports,

which were then delivered to the IQAC.

The institution's IQAC evaluates the teaching and learning process annually to determine its effectiveness and pinpoint areas for development because assessment is a periodic and ongoing activity. Students were the primary participants in the assessment of teaching that IQAC developed with input from all departments. The evaluation's credibility was enhanced by the triangulation of student input from various educational perspectives. The syllabus was changed in response to student requests to incorporate MOOC, NPTEL, and SWAYAM courses into the current curricula. Students who successfully complete these courses will receive additional credit.

Waste management activities are required to manage solid, liquid, e-wastes etc., from its origin to final disposition.

The solid wastes generated in campus are disposed off in a systematic way. Dustbins are placed everywhere to collect the wastes. The biodegradable waste and litters are sent to the yard for humification process and it is taken care by the Department of Botany. The produced humus is mixed with kitchen wastes of the hostel, and vermicomposted in campus. It is monitored by Department of Zoology. Non-biodegradable wastes are disposed with the help of Salem Corporation.

Liquid waste in campus is disposed in a systematic way through proper drainage system.

The students and teachers are sensitized about the effects of e-wastes. E-source reduction is achieved through minor repairs of devices. The e-wastes are classified and set apart in a separate room.

Fume hood and exhaust fans are used in laboratories to minimize the exposure to hazardous chemical substances. Chemical wastes are reduced by adopting semi-micro/micro-techniques and experiments involving carcinogenic solvent are replaced with computational modeling. The PG projects are undertaken giving due emphasis to more green and society oriented. Indoor plants are maintained in the laboratory for air purification and aesthetic purpose.
