Evaluation Pattern

The various assessment components are quiz, snap test, viva-voce, seminar, listening comprehension, reading comprehension, problem solving, map reading, group discussion, panel discussion, assignment, field visit, poster presentation, open book test, writing composition, case study, online test, Book Review, Projects etc.

The CIA marks are read out and signed by the students in the respective classes on the day specified in the calendar. CIA is mandatory for all the students.

PASSING MINIMUM

The candidate shall be declared to have passed the examination if the candidates secure not less than 35 marks out of 70 marks in the semester examination in each theory course and in total (CIA mark + Theory ESE) not less than 50 marks.

The candidates shall be declared to have passed the examination if she secures not less than 50 marks in total (CIA mark + Practical Exam mark) with minimum of 30 marks out of 60 marks in the Practical exam conducted by the University. There is no passing minimum for the record notebook. However, submission of the record notebook is necessary. Candidate who does not obtain the required minimum marks for a pass in a Course/Practical shall be declared Reappear (RA) and the candidate has to appear and pass the same at a subsequent appearance.
